## Bayou Sauvage NWR

This is one of my all time favorite spots to go birding. The refuge is a 23,000-acre region of fresh and brackish marshes located within the city of New Orleans. It is the largest urban wildlife refuge in the US. The endangered brown pelican nest here year round.

## City Park's Couterie Forest

Couterie Forest is another urban escape within New Orleans. Combined with Scout Island, the 60-acre area is a nature lover's dream come true. The Forest is made up of eight different eco-systems and includes New Orleans' highest point of elevation, Laborde Mountain – an impressive 43 ft. about sea level! Nosebleeds are common, so come prepared!

# Summer Travels


Summer is a great time to explore nearby parks and recreational areas. Here are some of my favorite places in Louisiana!

## Avery Island

### Tensas River National Wildlife Refuge

## Pinecone Bird Feeders

Making a pinecone birdfeeder is a fun way to get kids out in the backyard

#### Items Needed:

Pinecones Peanut butter (or Crisco if allergies) Bag of wild birdseed String to tie to tree Take your pinecones and roll them in the peanut butter or Crisco. Get as much peanut butter or Crisco into the pinecone as possible. Roll the sticky pinecone in a flat pan of the birdseed. Attach with a string and hang in your backyard tree. Enjoy!

# Ways to Get Your Kids Outside!

### Plant a Garden

You don't need to have acres of land to plant a lovely garden. It can be a container garden, if there isn't any available land. Start off with herbs or pretty flowers. But try to plant native species that will attract native critters (butterflies and bees) – which help our environment!





## Go Bird watching

There are so many wonderful spots in New Orleans to watch birds. You may be up at the "Fly" at a soccer game. Walk along the river and see if you can find an Eastern phoebe or anhinga. Bring binoculars and a good birding guide. I love Sibley's Guide to Eastern Birds!

### Plan a Scavenger Hunt

You can do this in your backyard or at Audubon Park. Make a list of things for the kids to find such as pine cones, acorns, cicada molts, pine needles, twigs, round rocks, etc. Teaching children to look around and observe their surroundings is incredibly valuable – and fun!





## Alfresco Art Class

Bring paints or crayons (whatever you want) and set up a spot to draw or paint a tree or a pretty view. Set up a blanket or even a small easel. Bring a picnic and make an afternoon of it. Even for those who have trouble drawing, abstracts can be fun and freeing! Read SARK!
